During the workshop the facilitator will review of grant requirements; Review of basics of grant writing (if needed); Review of current status of your organization's readiness to apply for funding; Develop plans to address needs or gaps in readiness; Develop a task list and help the attendee's assign responsibilities for completing the application process; and discuss other funding opportunities.

Description: This training is intended for Substance Abuse Prevention Specialists who have been in the field 0-5 years; Substance Abuse Prevention Managers and Supervisors. Registration is by invitation only.

Developed by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's Center for the Application of Prevention Technologies (CAPT) to prepare prevention professionals for work in their community in a proven effective way, SAPST will walk participants through the Strategic Prevention/Planning Framework.

Region 12 Prevention Workshop: Addressing Drug Abuse in the Community

Description: The Jefferson County Drug Prevention Task Force has partnered with the City of Pine Bluff and the University of Arkansas Pine Bluff to address drug abuse in the community. Drug overdose is now the leading cause of injury death in the United States. Opioid analgesics, such as prescription painkillers, account for approximately eighty percent (80%) of those deaths. Drug overdose rates have increased. The presentations at this workshop will address ways to counteract the current drug trends in the community and discuss how prevention tools can be utilized to reduce the number of deaths related to opioid abuse and other drugs. We will also address and explore the six principles of the Prevention Code of Ethics; a four-step decision-making process, designed to help practitioners navigate the ethical dilemmas they face.

Fetal Alcohol Syndrome Disorder

Description: Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASD) includes Fetal Alcohol Syndrome and other alcohol related birth disorders. FASD is the leading cause of intellectual deficit in the United States. It is often associated with mental illness and other secondary disabilities. Effects are permanent, yet early recognition and intervention can make a tremendous positive difference in life-outcomes for affected individuals and families. This course is a universal introductory training to FASD. Because traditional interventions and therapies often don't work well with children with FASD, this session will identify sensory, communication, learning and other differences that occur with this brain disorder. It will provide some effective intervention strategies that build on child and family strengths and highlight the importance of prevention secondary disabilities.

Trainers

Jermaine Anderson is a native of Pine Bluff, AR. He attended high school at Paul Laurence Dunbar in Lexington, KY. Jermaine received an Athletic Scholarship to the University of Memphis to continue his education. While at the University of Memphis he majored in Electronic Engineering. In 2005 Jermaine transferred to the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff and graduated in 2008 with a Bachelor degree in Industrial Technology. Since 2011 Jermaine has been Executive Director for Community Empowerment Council and is responsible for five foster homes, an at-risk feeding program, and mentoring/tutoring programs. In June 2017, Jermaine became Region 12 Prevention Coordinator, with his connection to the community, he continues to focus on community collaboration, volunteer opportunities and community leadership roles.

Melissa Ayers is the Project Leader for a Partnership For Success Grant. She is the leader of the Out of the Dark Prevention squad in Craighead County. Her Squad members represent Valley View High School and Jonesboro High School and have been active in the Out of the Dark anti drug and alcohol school clubs for several years.

Michael Cima, PhD, MPH is currently a public health preparedness epidemiologist at the Arkansas Department of Health. Dr. Cima relocated to the Little Rock area in July 2017 from Morgantown, West Virginia, where he attended West Virginia University to study epidemiology.

Richard Davies, a certified law enforcement instructor, continues to train officers, teachers, and school administrators all over the country to better prepare them to be more effective working with the School Resource Officer programs in the public school system. He specializes in awareness, intervention, and prevention programs involving juvenile crime, gangs, drugs, and other law related education programs. A graduate of Northwestern University's School of Police Staff and Command, and with more than 3,200 hours of training, Richard holds a Senior Certificate (law enforcement highest certificate level). He was a nationally recognized School Resource Officer before being promoted to Sergeant and Supervisor of the cities' Law Related Education and Community/Public Relations Programs. He also served as President of the Arkansas Safe Schools Association.

Cheryl Jackson-Golden PhD is currently employed at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff as an Assistant Professor in the Addiction Studies Program. She is a Prevention Specialist and she was previously employed as the Department Chair at Arkansas Baptist College. At Arkansas Baptist College she helped changed the culture of campus in relation to Student Health by successfully bringing federally funded mental health awareness programs to campus and by training the students to be peer educators and mental health first responders. In her home town of Pine Bluff she worked tirelessly in the community as the Prevention Resource Coordinator in Region 12 for many years. She teaches periodically at the College of the Ouachitas in Malvern and the University of Phoenix. She is CEO of Golden & Associates Consulting, where she has worked in the private and public sector, in fields affecting public health, family enrichment, community development, and prevention; including Workforce Development.

Kendon L. Gray Sr. a Certified Prevention Specialist, has been a Regional Prevention Representative with Crowley's Ridge Development Council since 2006. Prior to starting his career in prevention, Kendon spent several years working in local government as the Mayor's Assistant in his hometown of Marianna; he also held the position of Program Coordinator for two youth serving programs. Passionate about prevention and its possibilities, Kendon takes every opportunity to raise awareness, educate, empower communities and preach the Power of Prevention.

Darla Kelsay is the Substance Abuse Prevention Coordinator for UA Little Rock/MidSOUTH Center for Prevention and Training. She worked as a Regional Prevention Provider for six years, educating and organizing communities in five counties to prevent and reduce substance abuse among youth and adults. A Certified Prevention Consultant, she serves on the board of the Arkansas Prevention Network and holds a Bachelor's Degree in Journalism from Ball State University.

Tanishia Lewis is a 2006 graduate of the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Business Administration. She currently works part time as a Regional Prevention Provider Assistant and as the Administrative Director of Residential and Emergency Shelter programs for foster children with Community Empowerment Council, Inc. She is passionate about helping youth and is pleased to be able to assist in impacting young lives and promoting healthy lifestyles.

Tiffani McAdoo is a Certified Prevention Specialist that recently oversaw the Strategic Prevention Framework Partnership for Success grant at UA Little Rock MidSOUTH. She is a full-time student at UA Little Rock and a member of the Arkansas Prevention Certification Board. She has a wealth of prevention knowledge on the community and state level and is certified to train Prevention Ethics and Substance Abuse Prevention Skills Training.
