MODULE 4 COACHING AND SUPERVISION TIPS

Keeping Children at the Center of the Work

- 1. During your next one-on-one case consultation, invite the worker to share any appreciation for or existing barriers in utilizing tools discussed in the last Deep Dive.
- 2. Challenge the worker to think about a child or family they are working with who might really benefit from completing a Three Houses activity or Safety House. Ask the worker what more they want to know about the child to guide their assessment and planning process.
- 3. After the worker has tried on a tool, ask them to describe their experience and to reflect on how information was gathered and whether or how it affected their assessment and planning process.
- 4. If a worker is struggling with gathering detail when using a tool, consider doing one or more of the following.
 - Listen for how the worker introduced the child to the interview. Did they provide a purpose for the interview? Did they offer various engagement techniques, such as providing pens, crayons, or markers, or allowing for breaks? Did they let the child guide the conversation?
 - Ask the worker to role play an interview using the tools, and provide the worker with constructive feedback.
 - Ask the worker what would make them more confident the next time they use the tool.
- 5. Support workers in developing good judgment about what information to share with caregivers, when to share (assessing safety), and how to share tools with caregivers.
- 6. Allow workers to practice introducing a child's completed activity to a caregiver. Bear in mind that talking with parents can be a difficult task for many. Provide suggestions on engaging caregivers and their responses.
- 7. When a worker shares a completed tool that they feel confident and proud of, ask permission to share it with the whole team!
