MAKING INVESTIGATIVE FINDINGS: INTRODUCTION

Time: 5 Minutes

Purpose: To introduce how investigators move from gathered information into investigative findings, determinations, and case action decisions following completion of investigative activities

Facilitator Notes:

- Reinforce: This day focuses on post-investigation processes.
- Clarifying the focus is not the same as re-investigating the case.
- Maintain focus on findings, determinations, case action, ongoing safety considerations, and professional decision-making.

Say:

Throughout the first five days of training, you focused heavily on:

- *Conducting investigations.*
- *Gathering information.*
- *Interviewing children and caregivers.*
- *Assessing safety concerns.*
- *Safety planning.*
- *Documentation and CHRIS application.*

At some point, however, investigators must move from gathering information to determining:

- *What the investigation supports.*
- *What findings are appropriate.*
- *What concerns remain.*
- *What actions should occur next.*

Investigations do not simply end when interviews are completed. Investigators must analyze the information gathered throughout the case and determine:

- *Whether maltreatment findings are supported.*
- *Whether ongoing safety concerns exist.*
- *Whether services or continued involvement are necessary.*
- *What documentation and recommendations support those decisions.*

Today's training focuses on what happens after investigative information is gathered and how investigators move cases toward findings, staffing, case action, and ongoing decision-making.

Before we discuss investigative determinations, let's first examine the purpose of investigative findings and why they matter throughout child welfare practice.

Key Points: (ensure the following are covered)

- Investigations move beyond information gathering into findings and case action.
- Determinations must be supported through information, documentation, and investigative reasoning.
- Ongoing safety concerns may continue even after investigative findings are made.
- Investigative decisions influence case progression and ongoing involvement.

Understanding Why Findings Matter

UNDERSTANDING WHY FINDINGS MATTER

Time: 10 minutes

Purpose: To help participants understand the purpose of investigative findings and how findings influence case action, ongoing safety considerations, court involvement, and continued family services

Participant Manual: Investigative Findings & Determinations Activity Packet- Activity 1: Why Findings Matter

Activity Set Up:

- This is a whole group discussion.
- Ensure that the participants have their activity packet available and ready.

Facilitator Notes:

- Reinforce to the participants that findings are connected to future case actions.
- Clarify that findings are not based on isolated information.

Activity Instructions:

- **Discuss:**
 - The purpose of investigative findings.
 - How findings influence case progression.
 - The relationship between findings, safety concerns, and case action.

- **Review:**
 - DCFS investigative determination options.
 - How findings are supported through gathered information and documentation.
- **Identify**
 - Why findings impact future decision-making, court proceedings, and ongoing involvement.

Say:

Investigative findings help determine:

- ***Whether maltreatment concerns are supported.***
- ***Whether ongoing safety concerns exist.***
- ***Whether continued involvement or services may be necessary.***
- ***What case action should occur next.***

Findings are not simply labels assigned at the end of an investigation. Findings impact:

- ***Case progression.***
- ***Family involvement.***
- ***Court action.***
- ***Service recommendations.***
- ***Ongoing monitoring and reassessment.***

Investigators must evaluate many things before determining whether findings are supported.

- ***Information gathered throughout the investigation.***
- ***Interviews and observations.***
- ***Collateral information.***
- ***Documentation and evidence.***
- ***Safety concerns and risk factors.***

Investigative findings should reflect:

- ***The totality of information gathered throughout the investigation.***
- ***Professional judgment.***
- ***Documentation and evidence.***
- ***Ongoing child safety considerations.***

Throughout today's activities, we will focus on how investigators move from gathered information into supported findings, recommendations, and continued case action.

Facilitator Questions: (ask the following questions and validate responses)

- Why are investigative findings important?

Facilitator Answers:

- Findings impact court and service involvement.
- Findings guide case progression.

Say:

Now, let's take a closer look at the different investigative determination options and how investigators decide which findings are supported.

Key Points: (ensure the following are covered)

- Investigative findings influence case progression and ongoing involvement.
- Findings must be supported through evidence, documentation, and investigative reasoning.
- Professional judgment plays an important role in determinations.
- Ongoing safety concerns may continue following investigative findings.

Findings, Exemptions & Determination Rationale



FINDINGS, EXEMPTIONS & DETERMINATION RATIONALE

Time: 30 Minutes

Purpose: To introduce participants to DCFS investigative determination requirements, including the statutory determination categories, the preponderance of the evidence standard, True but Exempted determinations, documentation, and exercising professional judgment while supporting investigative conclusions, and case action decisions

Participant Manual: Investigative Findings & Determinations Activity Packet - Activity 2: Determination, Exemption & Rationale

Say:

The first two determination categories, True and Unsubstantiated, are distinguished by the preponderance-of-the-evidence standard.

- *A preponderance of the evidence means that, based on the information gathered during the investigation, the allegation is more likely than not supported by the evidence.*
- *When the evidence supports the allegation by a preponderance of the evidence, a True determination may be made; when the allegation is not supported by a preponderance of the evidence, an Unsubstantiated (Unsub) determination may be made.*

As you make this decision, do not focus on whether you have information that simply

supports the allegation. Consider the totality of the information gathered and whether that information supports the allegation by the applicable legal standard.

- ***Your professional judgment is important, but that judgment must be grounded in the investigative information, documentation, and applicable statutory requirements.***

A True but Exempted determination is still a True determination. However, under Arkansas Code § 12-18-702(a)(3), certain statutory circumstances may result in the offender's name not being placed on the Child Maltreatment Central Registry.

- ***A True but Exempted determination is therefore not the same as an Unsubstantiated determination. The allegation has been determined to be True, but the statutory requirements for exemption from Central Registry placement apply.***

Facilitator Note:

- Do not describe True but Exempted as a finding that the allegation was “not serious enough” or that the offender “poses no risk.” Those concepts should not be conflated.

Say:

There is another separate process that occurs after a True determination. When a report is determined to be True, the Department must determine whether the offender may pose a risk of maltreatment to a vulnerable population. This is referred to as a vulnerable-population risk determination. The vulnerable-population risk determination is separate from a True but exempted determination.

Keep these two processes distinct:

- ***True, but Exempted is a statutory investigative determination under Arkansas Code Ann. § 12-18-702(a)(3)***
- ***The vulnerable-population risk assessment occurs after a True determination under Arkansas Code Ann. § 12-18-702(c).***

Facilitator Notes:

- Highlight the connection between determinations, the Child Maltreatment Central Registry, and administrative hearing rights.
- Reinforce applicable investigation and determination timeframes.
- Connect the determination to ongoing safety concerns and next steps in case action.

Activity Instructions:

This next activity is a group discussion.

Review, Discuss, and identify the following:

Review:

- DCFS investigative determination categories.
- Determination, rationale, and expectations.
- True but Exempted (No Risk) recommendation process.
- The preponderance- of- the- evidence standard.

- Inactive determinations.
- The vulnerable-population risk assessment following a True determination.
- Notification and administrative hearing rights.

Discuss:

- What information supports determinations.
- How considerations of risk and vulnerable populations impact findings.
- Why findings require documentation and rationale support.
- How the preponderance-of-the-evidence standard applies.
- What happens following a True determination.
- How determinations affect Central Registry placement.
- Why notification and administrative hearing rights are important.

Identify:

- What information would support or prevent a True but Exempted (No Risk) recommendation.
- Circumstances that may support a True but Exempted determination.
- Information supporting an Unsubstantiated determination.
- Information that must be documented to support the investigative determination.
- Factors considered when determining whether an offender may pose a risk to a vulnerable population

Facilitator Note:

Vulnerable Population Criteria Under Arkansas Code § 12-18-702 Investigative Determination, a determination that an individual may pose a risk to a vulnerable population considers the level of risk and whether the individual may pose a risk of maltreatment to a vulnerable population, including, but not limited to, children, persons with disabilities, and persons with mental illness.

The following factors are considered when determining whether an individual may pose a risk to a vulnerable population:

- The severity of the child maltreatment;
- The nature and severity of any injury or other adverse impact caused by the child maltreatment;
- The offender's access to a vulnerable population;
- Any previous substantiated child maltreatment findings against the offender;
- Any subsequent reports of child maltreatment alleged against the offender; and
- The offender's criminal history.

Facilitator Question: (ask the following questions and validate responses)

- What factors should investigators consider when assessing vulnerable-population risk?

Facilitator Answers:

- Severity of the maltreatment.

- Nature and severity of the injury or other adverse impact.
- The offender's access to vulnerable populations.
- Previous substantiated maltreatment findings.
- Subsequent reports of maltreatment.
- Criminal history.

Facilitator Question: (ask the following questions and validate responses)

- Why does a True but Exempted determination require supervisory review?

Facilitator Answers:

- Supervisory review strengthens accountability and consistency and supports the rationale for the determination.

Participants may identify:

- Findings impact future child safety decisions.
- Documentation supports the determination rationale.
- True, but Exempted determinations require supporting rationale and supervisory review.

Say:

Now, let's begin applying these concepts by reviewing investigative information to determine which findings and case actions may be supported.

Key Points: (ensure the following are covered)

- Investigative findings must be supported through evidence and documentation.
- True, but exempted findings still require supervisory review and rationale.
- Risk considerations extend beyond a single incident.
- Professional judgment plays a significant role in investigative determinations.

Applying Findings & Case Action Decisions

APPLYING FINDINGS & CASE ACTION DECISIONS

Time: 25 minutes

Purpose: To provide participants with practice analyzing investigative information, evaluating determination options, identifying ongoing safety concerns, and supporting findings through documentation, evidence, and professional judgment

Participant Manual: Investigative Findings & Determinations Activity Packet - Activity 3: Applying Findings & Case Action Decisions

Paraphrase:

Now that we have reviewed the determination standards and the distinctions among the determination processes, we are going to apply those concepts to investigative scenarios.

As you review each scenario, focus on the evidence available, the applicable determination standard, and what the information tells you about the child's current safety and the need for continued case action.

- Your group will not be asked simply to identify a determination.
- You will also consider what supports that determination, what information remains unclear, what safety concerns continue, and what actions may be appropriate next.

Say:

Your investigative determination may also have implications for the Child Maltreatment

Central Registry. When an offender receives a True determination, the offender must be notified of the investigative determination and applicable rights.

- ***For applicable True determinations, the notice includes information about the right to request an administrative hearing. An alleged offender generally has 30 days from receipt of the notice to request an administrative hearing. The notice also provides information regarding the potential consequences of Central Registry placement and the right to have an attorney.***

Therefore, making the investigative determination is not necessarily the final procedural step.

The process may include:

- ***Investigative determination.***
- ***Notification of the alleged offender.***
- ***Administrative hearing rights.***
- ***Vulnerable-population risk considerations.***
- ***Central Registry determination and placement requirements.***

Timing is also an important part of the investigative process. Internal Procedure 403.15 requires the Investigator to conference with the Supervisor and to request the extension "by no later than the 40th day of the investigation. Timeliness does not replace the need for a thorough investigation. Specialists must remain aware of required timeframes and ensure that investigative activities, documentation, supervisory processes, and determinations are completed as required.

The fourth statutory determination category is Inactive. An investigation may be determined Inactive when the investigation cannot be completed because the Department and/or Arkansas State Police is unable to locate or identify the alleged offender or alleged victim, and a True or Unsubstantiated determination cannot be established without interviewing that person.

Inactive should not be treated as another way of saying that the allegation was Unsubstantiated. An Inactive determination reflects that the investigation could not be completed under the applicable circumstances.

As you move from investigative findings and determination into case action, consider what your determination tells you about the child's current safety, any ongoing concerns, and what actions may be necessary next.

Facilitator Question: (ask the following question and validate responses)

- What standard distinguishes a True determination from an Unsubstantiated determination?

Facilitator Answers:

- Preponderance of the evidence.
- A True determination requires the allegation to be supported by a preponderance of the

evidence.

- An Unsubstantiated determination is entered when the allegation is not supported by a preponderance of the evidence.

Facilitator Question:

- How is True but Exempted different from the vulnerable-population risk determination?

Facilitator Answers:

- True but Exempted is a statutory investigative determination.
- The vulnerable-population risk assessment occurs after a True determination.
- The two processes have different purposes.
- True, but Exempted concerns statutory exemption from Central Registry placement.
- The vulnerable-population risk determination evaluates whether the offender may pose a risk to a vulnerable population.

Activity Set Up:

- Participants work in groups at their tables.
- Investigative Findings & Determinations Activity Packet available and ready.

Facilitator Notes:

- Encourage the participants to have a group discussion and collaborative reasoning.
- Reinforce to the participants that findings are based on the totality of information gathered.

Activity Instructions:

- Review the investigative scenarios within the activity packet.
- **As a group, identify:**
 - Information supporting findings.
 - Ongoing safety concerns.
 - Corroborated information.
 - Documentation supporting determinations.
- **Discuss:**
 - Appropriate investigative findings.
 - Whether True but Exempted (No Risk) considerations may apply.
 - Recommended case action or services.
 - What additional information may still be needed.
- **Prepare to explain:**
 - Why did your group select a particular determination.
 - What evidence and documentation supported the decision.
 - What concerns remain following the investigation.

Say:

In this activity, your group will move beyond gathering information and begin applying

investigative findings and case action concepts to realistic investigative scenarios.

As investigators review cases for findings and recommendations, they must evaluate:

- *The totality of information gathered.*
- *Corroboration and documentation.*
- *Case progression and future involvement.*

Remember, investigative findings impact:

- *Child safety.*
- *Family involvement.*
- *Court action.*
- *Ongoing services.*
- *Division decision-making.*

As your group works through the activity packet, focus on:

- *What information supports the findings.*
- *What concerns continue following the investigation.*
- *What documentation supports determinations.*
- *What information may still require reassessment.*

As you work through the scenarios, avoid relying on personal opinions, assumptions, or isolated information. Instead, focus on:

- *The totality of the information.*
- *Investigative reasoning and documentation.*
- *Complicating factors.*
- *Ongoing safety assessment.*
- *Professional judgment.*

Key Points: (ensure the following are covered)

- Investigative findings must be supported through documentation, evidence, and investigative reasoning
- Complicating factor considerations continue beyond investigative findings.
- True, but Exempted findings require significant rationale and supervisory review.
- Ongoing reassessment remains important throughout case progression.



CONNECTING FINDINGS, DOCUMENTATION, AND ONGOING SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS

Time: 10 minutes

Purpose: To help participants reflect on how investigative findings, documentation, professional judgment, and ongoing safety considerations collectively influence case action decisions and future involvement

Participant Manual: Investigative Findings & Determinations Activity Packet - Activity 4: Connecting Findings, Documentation & Ongoing Safety

Activity Instructions:

- **Groups share:**
 - Determinations selected.
 - Information supporting findings.
 - Ongoing safety concerns identified.
 - Recommended case actions or services.
- **Discuss:**
 - How documentation and evidence supported findings.
 - What information strengthened or weakened determinations.
 - Why reassessment remains important following investigations.
- **Reflect** on how investigative findings influence the progression of future cases and involvement.

Facilitator Notes:

- Reinforce that findings connect directly to future case action.
- Connect content to the upcoming affidavit and court preparation days.

Paraphrase:

Investigative findings are among the most important outcomes of the investigative process because they directly influence the child's safety decisions and much more.

Throughout this activity, your groups analyzed:

- Information gathered throughout the investigation.
- Documentation and corroboration.
- Ongoing safety concerns.
- Professional judgment and complicating factor considerations.

Say:

One important takeaway is that investigations rarely end with every concern fully resolved. Investigators often continue balancing:

- ***Findings.***
- ***Ongoing safety concerns.***
- ***Family strengths and needs.***
- ***Future complicating factors and continued reassessment.***

This is why findings must be:

- ***Supported.***
- ***Documented.***
- ***Reviewed carefully.***
- ***Connected to the totality of information gathered throughout the investigation.***

As investigators move cases toward staffing, court involvement, services, or ongoing monitoring, findings become part of the larger case story and influence what happens next for children and families.

Facilitator Question: (ask the following question and validate responses)

- What concerns remained following the investigation?

Facilitator Answers:

- Ongoing safety concerns despite completed investigations.
- Continued need for services and monitoring.

Facilitator Question:

- Why is ongoing reassessment important even after findings are made?

Facilitator Answers:

- Child safety considerations continue throughout case progression.

Say:

Next, we'll begin focusing more closely on how evidence, documentation, investigative information support determinations, staffing, and supervisory review.

Key Points: (ensure the following are covered)

- Investigative findings influence the ongoing progression of the case and services.
- Documentation and evidence support findings and determinations.
- Ongoing safety concerns may continue following investigative closure.
- Professional judgment and reassessment remain important throughout case progression.



CASE STAFFING, SUPERVISORY REVIEW, AND RECOMMENDATIONS

CASE STAFFING, SUPERVISORY REVIEW, AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Case Staffing, Supervisory Review, and Recommendations



CASE STAFFING, SUPERVISORY REVIEW, AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Time: 5 minutes

Purpose: To introduce participants to case staffing, supervisory review, and recommendation processes following investigative findings and determinations

Facilitator Notes:

- Clarify that staffing is collaborative, not punitive.
- Maintain focus on professional communication, ongoing safety considerations, recommendation planning, and case progression.

Say:

Once investigators complete investigative findings and determinations, the case often moves into additional review, staffing, and recommendation discussions.

Investigators may be required to:

- *Present case information.*
- *Explain investigative findings.*
- *Discuss ongoing safety concerns.*
- *Identify family strengths and needs.*
- *Recommend services or ongoing involvement.*
- *Prepare cases for supervisory review or continued case action.*

These discussions help ensure:

- ***Findings are appropriately supported.***
- ***Ongoing safety concerns are addressed.***
- ***Recommendations are reasonable and supported.***
- ***Cases are prepared for the next steps within the Division.***

Staffing and supervisory review are important parts of child welfare practice because investigations do not operate in isolation. Cases often involve:

- ***Multiple perspectives.***
- ***Ongoing reassessment.***
- ***Continued family involvement.***
- ***Collaboration and professional review.***

This section focuses on how investigators participate in these discussions professionally and prepare cases for ongoing decision-making and case progression. Before we begin practicing staffing discussions, let's examine the purpose of staffing and what supervisors and ongoing Specialists need to understand about a case.

Key Points: (ensure the following are covered)

- Staffing and supervisory review help support ongoing case progression and decision-making.
- Investigators must communicate findings, concerns, and recommendations clearly.
- Ongoing safety concerns may continue following investigative findings.
- Staffing discussions often guide future Division involvement and services.

Target Outcomes



- Understand how staffing and supervisory review support ongoing case progression and decision-making.
- Apply investigative findings, ongoing concerns, and family information to staffing and recommendation discussions.
- Assess what information is important during staffing, supervisory review, and recommendation planning.

Understanding Ongoing Case Decision - Making

UNDERSTANDING ONGOING CASE DECISION - MAKING

Time: 10 minutes

Purpose: To help participants understand the purpose of staffing and supervisory review and how these processes support child safety, case progression, ongoing reassessment, and Division decision-making

Participant Manual: Case Staffing & Supervisory Review Activity Packet - Section 1: Preparing for Staffing

Facilitator Notes:

- Reinforce to the participants that staffing is collaborative and ongoing.

Activity Instructions:

- **Discuss:**
 - The purpose of staffing and supervisory review.
 - Why investigations continue influencing case progression after findings are made.
 - What case information supervisors and ongoing Specialists need to understand.
- **Review:**
 - Common topics discussed during staffing.
 - Ongoing safety considerations and reassessment needs.
 - Recommendation and service planning discussions.

- **Identify** why organization and professional communication are important during staffing.

Say:

Investigations rarely end with all concerns fully resolved. This is why staffing and supervisory review are important parts of DCFS practice.

Once findings are made, cases may continue involving:

- ***Ongoing safety concerns.***
- ***Service recommendations.***
- ***Family reassessment.***
- ***Court involvement.***
- ***Continued monitoring.***
- ***Transition to ongoing services.***

Paraphrase:

Staffing discussions help supervisors, investigators, and ongoing Specialists:

- Review investigative findings.
- Understand ongoing concerns.
- Identify family strengths and needs.
- Discuss service recommendations.
- Plan next steps for case progression.

These discussions also help ensure:

- Child safety concerns remain prioritized.
- Recommendations are supported and reasonable.
- Important information is communicated clearly.
- Ongoing Specialists understand the history and progression of the case.

Investigators play an important role during staffing because they help communicate:

- What occurred during the investigation.
- What concerns developed over time.
- What information supported findings.
- What concerns remain unresolved.
- What reassessment or services may still be necessary.

Strong staffing discussions require:

- Organization.
- Clear communication.
- Professional judgment.
- Understanding of ongoing safety considerations.
- Accurate understanding of the case progression.

Facilitator Question: (ask the following question and validate responses)

- Why are staffing discussions important?

Facilitator Answers:

- Staffing supports informed decision-making.
- Future Specialists need a clear understanding of the case.
- Safety concerns may continue beyond investigations.
- Recommendations and reassessment help guide future involvement.

Facilitator Question:

- Why is professional communication important during supervisory review?

Facilitator Answers:

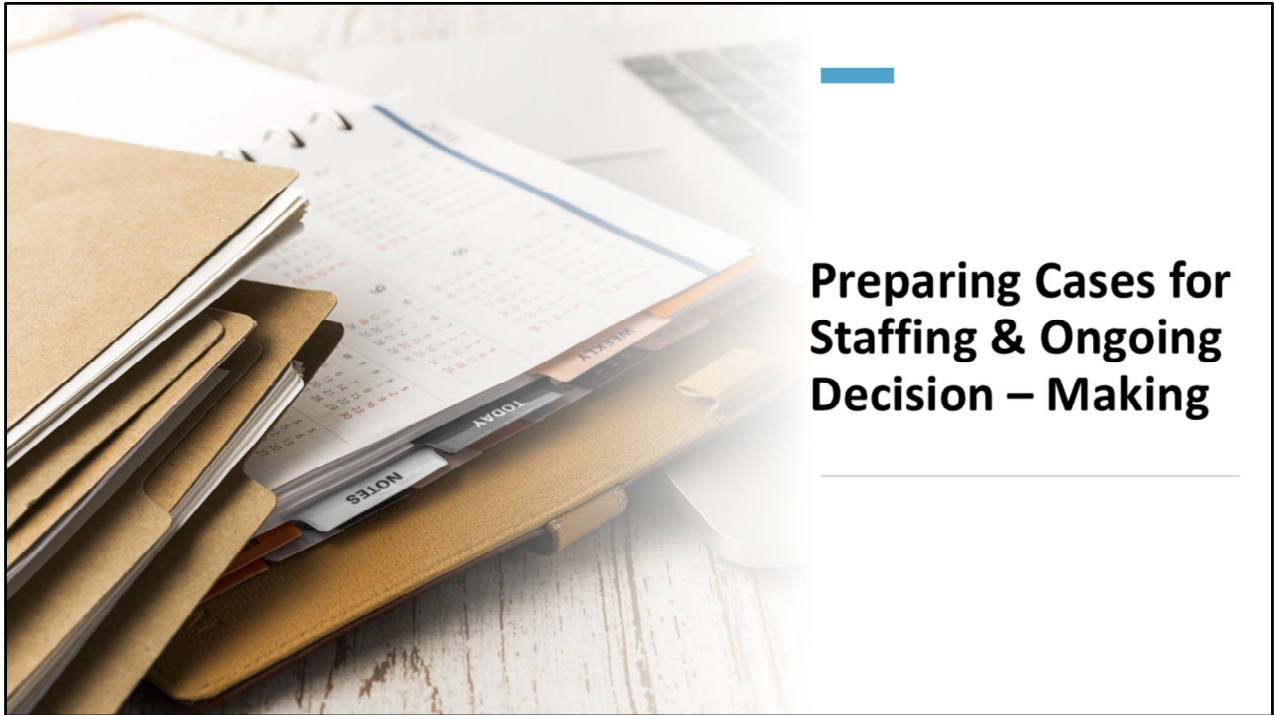
- Organization and communication strengthen staffing discussions.
- Professional communication supports continuity and informed decisions.

Say:

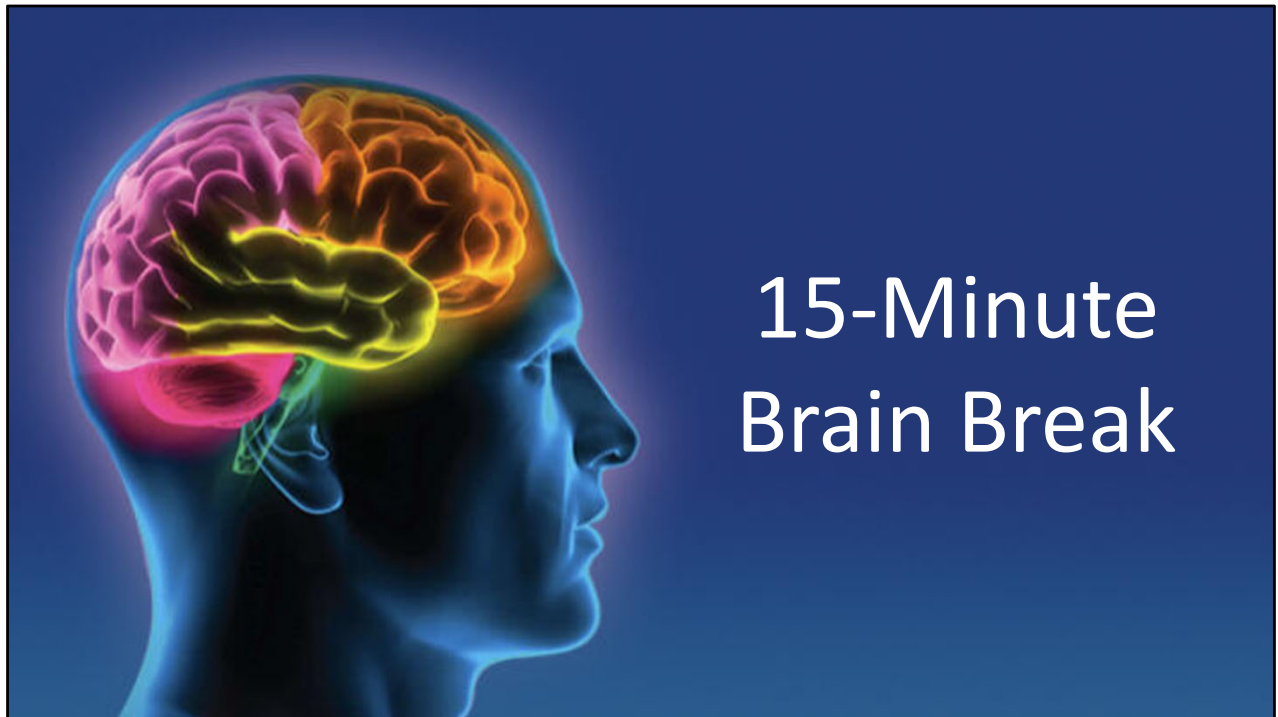

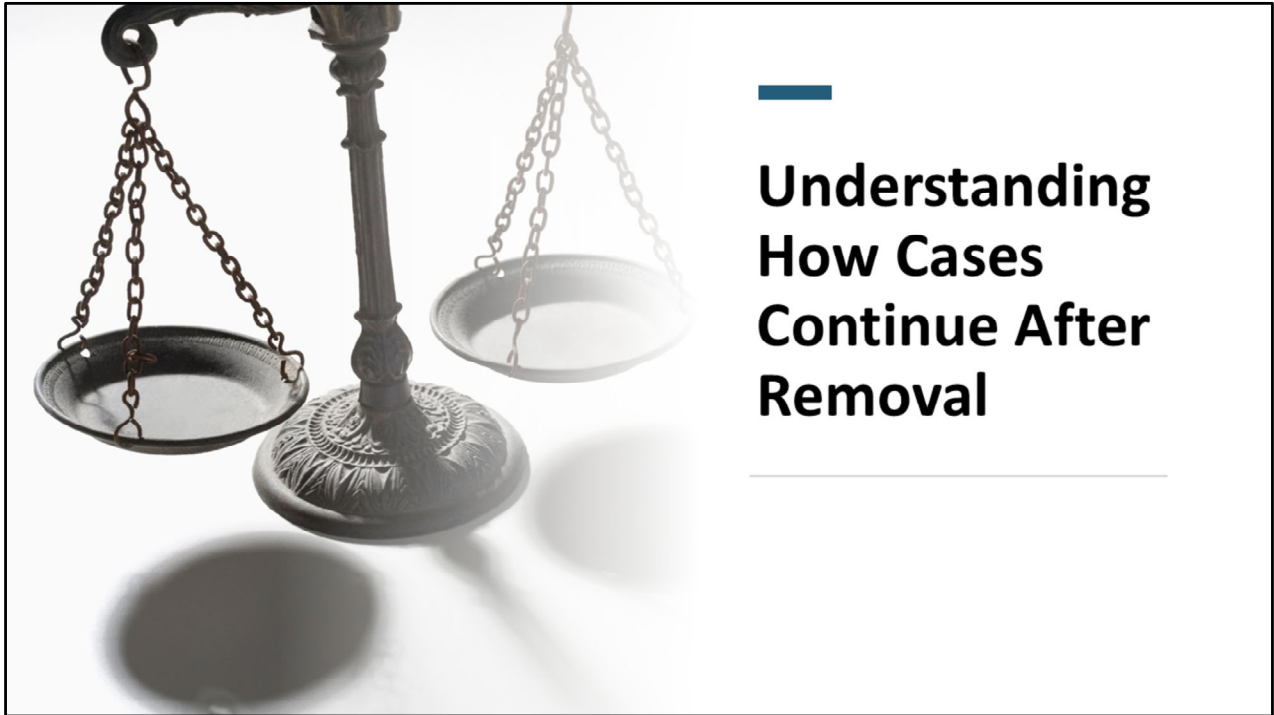

- Communication supports continuity and child safety.
- Communication and organization support continuity and reassessment.
- Ongoing Division involvement depends on accurate information-sharing.

Say:

Now, let's take a few minutes to discuss what information would be most important for ongoing Specialists to understand as a case transitions beyond the investigation stage.

Key Points: (ensure the following are covered)

- Communication supports continuity and child safety planning.
- Investigative information continues impacting cases after removal.
- Ongoing reassessment continues throughout Division involvement.
- Organization and coordination support continued case progression and monitoring.

Prioritizing Information During Case Transition



PRIORITIZING INFORMATION DURING CASE TRANSITION

Time: 20 minutes

Purpose: To help participants prioritize the most critical investigative information that ongoing Specialists, supervisors, and Division partners must understand as cases transition beyond the investigation stage

Activity Set Up:

- Participants pair with a partner.
- Facilitate verbal discussion activity.

Facilitator Notes:

- Reinforce: This activity focuses on prioritization rather than repeating case summaries.
- Encourage critical thinking and professional reasoning.
- **Participants should recognize:**
 - Not all information carries equal long-term significance.
 - Prioritization supports continuity and ongoing decision-making.
 - Certain concerns may significantly impact permanency and court progression.

Say:

As cases transition into ongoing Division involvement, not every detail carries the same level of urgency or long-term impact. Ongoing Specialists, supervisors, legal staff, and the court often rely on investigators to clearly identify the information that most

significantly impacts child safety, reassessment, permanency planning, and future decision-making.

This requires professional judgment and prioritization. Investigators must determine:

- *What information presents the greatest ongoing safety concern.*
- *What patterns or behaviors could continue impacting the children.*
- *What failed interventions or escalating concerns require continued monitoring.*
- *What family strengths or supports may influence future case planning.*
- *What information could significantly impact court recommendations or permanency decisions moving forward.*

In the Flowers' case, several concerns carried long-term significance beyond the initial removal itself, including:

- *Failed safety planning attempts.*
- *Escalating supervision concerns.*
- *The caregiver attempting to flee with the children.*
- *Ongoing emotional and caregiving concerns involving Frankie.*
- *Continued reassessment needs regarding caregiver functioning and stability.*

This activity is designed to help you think critically about how investigators identify and communicate information that cannot be overlooked as cases progress through court involvement, reassessment, and permanency planning.

Activity Instructions

- **With a partner, discuss:**
 - What investigative information would be most critical during case transition.
 - What concerns could significantly impact future case decisions if overlooked.
 - What information would be most important for ongoing Specialists to prioritize immediately.
- **Consider:**
 - Court involvement.
 - Placement stability.
 - Ongoing safety concerns.
 - Family functioning.
 - Failed safety planning efforts.
 - Protective capacities and supports.
 - Permanency considerations.
- **Be prepared to share:**
 - One piece of information your pair identified as “most critical”.
 - Why that information could significantly impact ongoing case progression.

Say: (After group sharing)

Now, let's close Section 4 by discussing the major takeaways from case transition, prioritization, and ongoing Division coordination.

Key Points: (ensure the following are covered)

- Prioritization helps ongoing Specialists focus on critical concerns.
- Certain investigative concerns may continue significantly impacting case progression.
- Professional judgment helps determine what information requires ongoing monitoring.
- Permanency and court decisions often rely on critical investigative information identified early in the case.

Prioritization & Communication

PRIORITIZATION AND COMMUNICATION

Time: 10 minutes

Purpose: To reinforce how prioritization, communication, coordination, and professional judgment support continuity and ongoing decision-making as cases transition beyond the investigation stage

Activity Instructions:

- **Discuss:**
 - What information participants identified as most critical during transition.
 - Why some concerns carry greater long-term impact.
 - How prioritization supports ongoing case progression.
- **Reflect on:**
 - How investigations continue influencing permanency and court decisions.
 - How continuity supports reassessment and long-term child safety planning.
 - Why organization and professional judgment remain important after investigations conclude.
- **Prepare for:**
 - Final Day 6 application and reflection section following break.

Say:

One important takeaway from today's discussions is that investigations continue to influence cases long after the initial investigation concludes. As cases transition to

ongoing Division involvement, the ability to prioritize, organize, and communicate critical information is essential for supporting continuity, reassessment, and future decision-making.

Throughout the Flowers case, we identified several concerns that carried ongoing significance beyond the initial removal, including:

- *Escalating supervision concerns*
- *Failed safety planning efforts*
- *Flight risk behaviors*
- *Ongoing emotional and caregiving concerns involving Frankie*
- *Continued reassessment needs related to caregiver functioning and stability*

We also discussed how investigators must use professional judgment to determine which information requires the greatest ongoing attention because not every detail carries the same long-term impact. Information prioritized during transition may continue influencing:

- *Placement stability*
- *Court recommendations*
- *Permanency planning*
- *Ongoing reassessment*
- *Continued safety planning*
- *Future Division decision-making*

As cases progress through continued court involvement and Division coordination, organization, continuity, and prioritization help ensure that important concerns are not overlooked and that children continue to receive appropriate protection, monitoring, and support throughout the life of the case.

Facilitator Question: (ask the following questions and validate responses)

- What concerns carried the greatest long-term significance in the Flowers case?

Facilitator Answers:

Participants may identify:

- Failed safety planning efforts.
- Escalating caregiver behavior.
- Flight risk concerns.
- Emotional functioning concerns involving Frankie.

Participants should recognize:

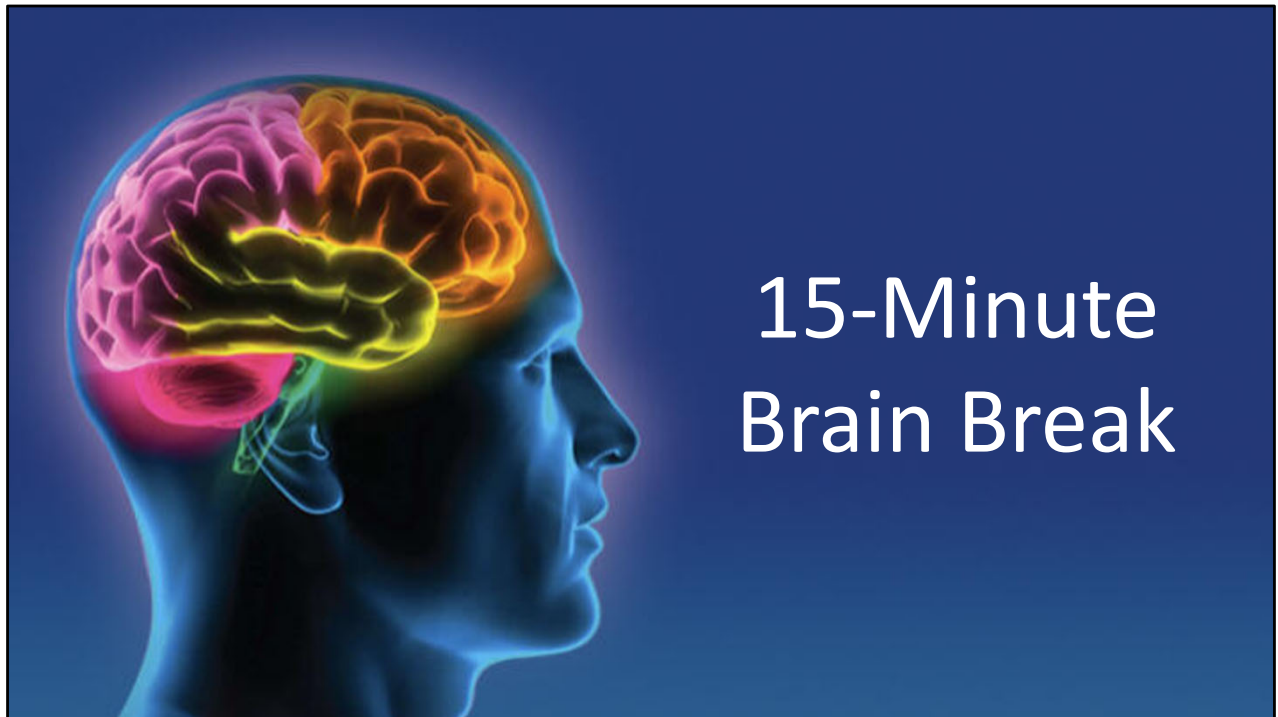
- Certain concerns continue impacting long-term case progression.
- Prioritization supports continuity and informed decision-making.
- Investigative information may continue influencing court and permanency decisions.

Say:

We are going to take a 15-minute break. When we return, we will close Day 6 by applying the full progression of the Flowers case from investigation through court involvement, ongoing Division coordination, and long-term case progression.

Key Points: (ensure the following are covered)

- Investigations continue to influence long-term case progression.
- Prioritization and continuity support reassessment and informed decision-making.
- Professional judgment helps identify concerns requiring continued monitoring.
- Court and permanency decisions may continue relying on investigative information gathered early in the case.

- ***We also examined how investigative decisions and documentation may continue influencing cases throughout the life of the case, not just during the initial investigation stage.***

One of the most important concepts from today is that investigations create the foundation for many future decisions involving:

- ***Court recommendations.***
- ***Placement stability.***
- ***Permanency planning.***
- ***Ongoing reassessment.***
- ***Service involvement.***
- ***Continued safety monitoring.***

We also discussed how investigators continue contributing to cases after removal by helping support:

- ***Accurate chronology and documentation.***
- ***Communication with OCC and supervisors.***
- ***Prioritization of critical concerns.***
- ***Continuity during transition.***
- ***Ongoing reassessment and coordination.***

As you move into field practice, it is important to recognize that investigations often continue impacting cases far beyond the point of removal. The quality of investigative documentation, organization, communication, and professional judgment may continue influencing legal progression, permanency planning, and child safety decisions throughout the life of the case.

As we close Day 6, remember that documentation, chronology, communication, reassessment, and professional judgment continue to impact court progression, permanency planning, and long-term child safety decisions throughout the life of the case.

Tomorrow, we will begin focusing more specifically on how investigators organize and document information through affidavits and legal documentation that support probable cause, court action, and continued legal progression.
